Principal's Report



PBL Shelley Expectations and Parent Behaviour

I continue to be impressed by the enthusiasm of our students for learning, their energetic joy for helping others and the high standard of behaviour demonstrated by most Shelley students. Well done to our Shelley Super Star Learners.

Later in the newsletter I have provided a copy of Shelley PS expectations. One of the keys to the success of our PBL (Positive Behaviour for Learning) is the partnership with parents. We recognise the importance of your support in reiterating the values with our students – to ensure that they understand these are shared community expectations.

We are all expected to be safe, respectful and responsible learners in all aspects of our Shelley PS life. It is not only our staff who expect these behaviours, but the parents as well. And of course, we encourage all students to have these expectations of themselves.

Unfortunately on occasion, Mrs Williams and I notice a slight increase in some unacceptable behaviours by a small number of students – particularly offensive language, and disappointingly some repeated disobedience, aggressive behaviour and fighting. A reminder, our school discipline policy does not tolerate fighting, irrespective of who the fight is started by. Fighting will be dealt with using the Department of Education Suspension and Expulsion policy and procedures.

I would particularly like to remind parents that it is NEVER acceptable for a parent to approach someone else's child to discuss behaviour at school. I still have occasional reports of parents taking it upon themselves to do so. Parents or visitors failing to adhere to this will be dealt with under the Inclosed Lands Act, and may be banned from school grounds for a period of time.

Colds and Illness - Should my child attend school? (Repeated from last newsletter)

In the midst of winter, we naturally have many cold and flu "bugs". Although regular attendance at school is important – it is also essential that children are fit and well when at school. This is particularly important in the current climate of increasing COVID numbers.

Children who are unwell should be kept at home, until the symptoms have cleared.

We often have reports of students diagnosed with various strands of influenza. Influenza is a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses. Exposure to influenza at school can cause illness for large numbers of students and teachers— so we ask parents to help us by ensuring their children remain at home if they are unwell.

If your child has been vomiting or had diarrhoea, the best advice is to keep them home until 24 hours after the vomiting / diarrhoea has stopped.

IMPORTANT REMINDER: What to do if your child tests positive to Covid


If your child tests positive for Covid, you MUST:

notify NSW Health via the Service NSW App.
 (Go to Covid-19 Resources and scroll down to Register a positive test result and follow the instructions).

and ALSO

Notify the school immediately.

You can do this by phoning the office or by submitting a form via the Shelley Skoolbag App (Go to eForms - select Covid Positive / Isolation Advice and complete the details).



Changes to requirements for close contacts mean that students and staff who are identified as close contacts are able to attend school with certain risk mitigations in place.

- **Rapid Antigen Tests** (RATs) which the department has supplied to support symptomatic testing and testing of close contacts returning to school.
- **Masks** with a new recommendation from NSW Health for people who have recently recovered from COVID-19 to wear a mask for an additional 3 days following their 7-day isolation period (from days 8 to 10).

As we all work so hard to keep our school community healthy this winter, we thank parents for keeping children home when they are unwell. We appreciate your support. With the subsequent increase in absences, we remind parents that all Covid absences MUST be reported immediately.



For all other absences, we request these are notified within THREE (3) days of the absence.

You can notify us of your child's absence:

- via the Skoolbag App
 - EFORMS Absentee Form
- by writing a note to the class teacher OR
- by phoning the school office on 9622 8359

A reminder: multiple UNEXPLAINED absences will result in contact from a member of the School Executive and may require a parent meeting with the Principal or Deputy Principal.

Thank you for your assistance with this. Many parents find the quickest and easiest way to avoid UNEXPLAINED absences, is to utilise the School APP. You can enter an Absent Note on the front page of the APP - simply enter the details and your note will be sent to the teacher.



Tell Them From Me Surveys - Years 4-6

Later this term, our school is taking part in the Tell Them From Me student survey. The survey will provide us with valuable feedback on what our students think about school life, how engaged they are with school and the different ways that teachers interact with them. Schools in Australia and around the world have used the Tell Them From Me survey to help them improve. The survey is completed online and is run by an

independent research company, **The Learning Bar** which specialises in school-based surveys. Students in Yeras 4-6 take part in the TTFM Survey twice a year- and in Week 10, they will take part in the second survey for 2022.

Staff in schools will **not** be able to identify individual students from their responses. To ensure confidentiality, participating students will receive a unique username and password. Where fewer than five students respond to a question, the results will be suppressed. The survey typically takes 30 minutes or less to complete and will be administered by the school during normal school hours. Once the surveys are completed by students, reports are prepared and in most cases are available to schools within three business days.

This survey will help out school better understand how to improve student wellbeing and engagement. It will help the school identify what works to improve student outcomes.

If you do not want your child to take part in the survey, please complete the non-consent form (which was emailed to families today) and return it to the school by Monday 12th September.

Participating in the survey is entirely voluntary. Your child will not take part if either you or your child do not wish. If, during the survey, your child is uncomfortable, he/she can choose to stop the survey at any time. The majority of questions in the survey can be skipped.

Lost Property

We frequently remind students about the importance of labelling all items of clothing and checking lost property for missing items. Occasionally I hear of jumpers that have gone missing for weeks at a time – only to turn up later and be returned to the owner because it is clearly labelled. It is common for students to inadvertently pick up items of clothing, particularly hats, jumpers and jackets, which do not belong to them. It is helpful if parents can check their children's school uniforms as they are going through the wash. If you notice an item that does not belong to your child, please return it to the school as soon as possible – as its prompt return may save another parent the expense of replacing the missing item unnecessarily.

The Lost Property bins, outside the library are frequently overflowing with lost jumpers and jackets. Please remind your child to check the bins and the rack, if they have lost an item of clothing.

Check-in assessment for Year 6

During Term 3, Year 6 students will participate in the Check-in assessment.


The Check-in assessment is a NSW Department of Education online literacy and numeracy assessment available to support schools to assess and monitor student learning.

The assessment can supplement existing school practices to identify how students are performing in literacy and numeracy and to help teachers tailor their teaching more specifically to student needs. Students with a disability may receive the same level of support during the assessment they would normally receive in the classroom.

- The assessment will be scheduled for our Year 6 students during Week 8.
- Students will complete a reading assessment and a numeracy assessment. Year 6 students will also complete a writing task.



Parents will be notified of all levels via Student Contact Cards.

Parents will receive a warning letter after a student's 2nd detention informing parents & student that they are at risk of exclusion. In addition, a planning meeting will be arranged with parents for Levels 3 & 4 and an exclusion letter will be given.
